- Founded in 1897 at the University of Maine, Phi Kappa Phi is the nation's oldest, largest, and most selective all-discipline honor society.
- The Society's mission is "to recognize and promote academic excellence in all fields of higher education and to engage the community of scholars in service to others."
- The motto of Phi Kappa Phi is *Philosophía Krateítō Phōtôn*, translated "let the love of learning rule humanity."
- Those elected to membership include upper 7.5 percent last-term juniors (having completed at least seventy-two semester hours) and upper 10 percent seniors, along with outstanding graduate students, faculty, professional staff, and alumni.
- Since its founding, more than 1 million scholars have been inducted into Phi Kappa Phi.
- Approximately 3,000 faculty and staff volunteers give of their time to serve as officers of local Phi Kappa Phi chapters.
- More than 300 chapters of Phi Kappa Phi exist on the campuses of colleges and universities across the United States, Puerto Rico, and the Philippines.
- The Society's official symbols include the Phi Kappa Phi key, ribbon, and seal.
- One million dollars is awarded each biennium in national and local scholarships.

Literacy Grants*

The Literacy Grants program was initiated to mobilize members and resources of Phi Kappa Phi and the higher education community to champion literacy initiatives. Grants of up to \$2,500 are available to Phi Kappa Phi chapters and individual members to fund ongoing literacy projects or create new initiatives.

The Society's commitment to the cause of literacy is consistent with its mission, which was expanded to include "...and to engage the community of scholars in service to others."

In 2013, Dr. Kathleen Brown, NC State's former chapter President, received a grant to promote the Read to L.E.A.D. (Learn. Engage. Ask. Do.) project, coordinated by NC State's Women's Center.



The Read to L.E.A.D. program is relationship-based and seeks to provide literacy development and intentional conversations about gender, race/ethnicity, class and ability. Volunteers and children read books related to these topics while engaging in discussions and the practice of reading and writing skills. The program also provides an innovative approach to literacy through the use of technology, interactive drawing tools, podcasts and blogging.

During the past year, the Read to L.E.A.D. program has reached:

- 70 elementary-age youth at the Boys and Girls Club, Neighbor 2 Neighbor, and Youth 4 Hope;
- 14 middle school-age youth at the YMCA;
- 81 college-age mentors and numerous staff and faculty members.

Participants' responses to the program include excitement to build relationships with the mentees and with other children; learning to love reading; and enjoying their memorable visit to NC State campus.
